Jeannette Ross Lecture: Protecting the Environment in the Face of Today's Challenges

Please join us on March 22, 2017 for the Jeanette Ross Memorial Lecture, *Creating the World We Want in Uncertain Times - Case Studies in Sustainable Transformation from Higher Education*, by Aurora Winslade, Sustainability Director, Office of the President, Swarthmore College.

"During this era of certain climate weirding and rising violence against those who are 'different,' and while many of our political leaders continue to engage in denialism, what is the role of the community and the individual to be part of solutions? This talk will explore frameworks for making sense of the mess we find ourselves in and the pathways that have the potential to lead us out of them," Winslade said. She will talk about strategies to improve overall quality of life: carbon pricing, culture change, and sustainability planning and will use case stories to illustrate how people are finding ways to build better communities together and to create a healthy and resilient world.

Winslade brings more than a decade of experience in higher education and energy efficiency efforts in the private sector. In 2012, Winslade launched the sustainability office of the University of Hawaii. As a student at the University of California, Santa Cruz and as its first sustainability director, Winslade spent more than 10 years developing a range of sustainability programs. In her role at Swarthmore, Winslade works closely with an array of campus constituencies to ensure that the College's sustainability programs reflect its Quaker roots and the long tradition of honoring the natural environment.

The lecture is an evening program that begins at 7 p.m. at Media Borough Hall Community Room. The talk is about 45- 50 minutes followed by a question and answer session as well as discussion. Light snacks and beverages will be served. Free and open to the public.

9. **Run for Office**

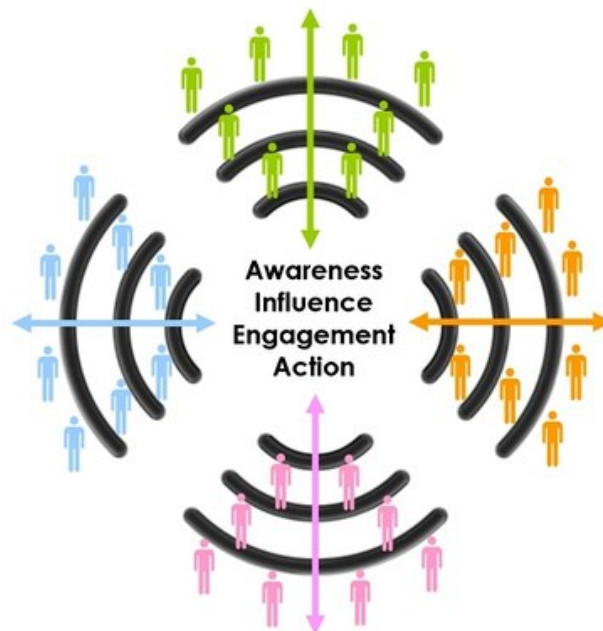
You can directly contribute to the direction of local politics in your own back yard. From school board to the state house, there are many opportunities to run for office and make a difference.

Why We Are Studying Behavioral Health

Mental and behavioral health and drug addiction may seem an odd topic for an organization dedicated to voting rights to tackle, but the League of Women Voters studies and speaks out on many issues where public policies affect any aspect of American lives. Nationwide, the Affordable Care Act mandated mental health care parity and mental health care greatly improved as a result, but that may be changing. In addition, Delaware County has become a national leader in dealing with drug addiction. After much discussion, the local Leagues have decided we need to know a great deal more about what is happening within the county so we can be more actively involved in this critically important issue.



Donna Holiday and Tracey Halliday from the Delaware County Behavioral Health Department will be our kick off speakers at the March 10 Hot Topics Luncheon. They will talk about what their department is doing for the residents of Delaware County. Mental health and drug addiction are services administered by two separate divisions, but Holiday tells us that about 83 percent of the county's clients have co-morbidities or dual problems and there are a lot of crossovers between the two. Noon in the Community Room of Media Borough Hall. Cost is \$18.

We need to find out what the key issues are facing Delaware County, what resources are available to adults and children to deal with those issues, what services are most frequently utilized and where the gaps are. For example, did you know in 2013 the Excellence in Mental Health Act was passed to amend the US Public Health Service Act? Some states and counties are getting funding but is Pennsylvania or Delaware County

among them? We need to learn about how the Affordable Care Act impacts behavioral health and what changes to the act might impact people in Delaware County. We need to know more about which services are being provided and whether this is another reason for a County Health Department.

The League would like to speak out on this issue and at our last national convention we adopted a position on Behavioral Health <http://forum.lwv.org/member-resources/article/notice-intent-lwvus-board-propose-concurrence-behavioral-health>. However before we can speak we need to learn more about what treatment and support resources are available, funding sources, organizations working on this issue and what is happening in general on this critically important issue.
